

Questions. For the sentences below, draw the structure of the sentence. Where something moves, draw an arrow from the trace to its next position. Mark [uclause-type:] and [uwh\*] features, and show how they are checked/valued by drawing a line between the heads that have the matching features. You need not mark the other features.

**Triangles/shortcuts:** Except where there is something "interesting" inside DP, you do not need to draw out the full internal structure. If there is a pronounced D, you should draw the D, but the nP can be drawn with a triangle (possibly implicit). Proper names can be written as DP with a triangle (possibly implicit). You should still draw adjuncts out (to show they're adjoined). You can write "V+ $\nu$ " or "N+n" instead of drawing the full complex heads, but you still need to draw the movement arrow. Where T has moved to C, best to draw the complex head so that you can show where the clause-type features are. Examples are below.



Example: Who did Bernard meet?



- (1) a. Which book did Igor read?
  - b. Who was introduced to Pat?
  - c. Did the boat sink?
  - d. When did Pat find the note?
  - e. Who appears to have left early?
  - f. Who should we ask to leave?
  - g. They asked if the boat sank.
  - h. They seem to know who I should meet.
