

Tree practice.

1 Drawing some trees.

Your turn. Draw trees for the sentences below. **Ground rules for drawing the trees:**

- We now know how to use Agree, so you need to show the uninterpretable agreement features ($[\mu\text{Infl:}]$) and how they're valued.
- You *do not* need to show each step. Show the tree in its *final* form. That means: show everything that moves in the location it has moved to.
- Draw arrows indicating the movements.
- Draw angled brackets ($\langle \rangle$) around the traces.
- If you move a head, draw the complex head that results (not $V+v$).
- We now differentiate between strong and weak uninterpretable features (so indicate * where needed)
- C-selection features (like $[\mu\text{N}^*]$) are strong.

- (1) Chris will call Pat on Friday.
- (2) Pat called Chris on Tuesday.
- (3) Pat was putting leaflets on cars with glee.
- (4) Frosty melted.
- (5) Santa frowned thoughtfully.
- (6) Rudolph has not been sleeping.
